

7. **Global Society [GLS]** - These courses help students understand and affirm their membership in a diverse yet interdependent multicultural global society. Emphasis is placed, through careful selection of course content and, in some cases, through appropriate travel-study experiences, on *primary encounters* with cultures other than the students' own. *Foreign Language: New students with less than one year of a foreign language in high school or college are required to meet the **Global Society** category by completing a two course sequence in the Department of Foreign Language. New students who graduated from high school more than eight years ago are exempt from the requirement to meet the **Global Society** requirement through foreign language. Students who complete any foreign language course at Elmhurst College 102 level or above fulfill the **Global Society** requirement.*
